

GSTC Industry Criteria

The GSTC-HTO Criteria have been revised to form the GSTC Industry Criteria. The Industry Criteria currently apply to Hotels and Tour Operators, but now there are for the first time separate Performance Indicators for the two.

The table below shows the current GSTC-HTO Criteria and the equivalent revised GSTC Industry Criteria, highlighting the main changes made. (Minor edits of wording or grammar are not shown).

This revision report is provided to assist GSTC-Recognized standards owners to identify the changes which they may need to make to their standard in order for it to retain GSTC-Recognized status. As stated in the GSTC Recognized Manual, the owners of Recognized standard must make any necessary changes to their standard within two years from the formal release date of the revisions.
